PASTOR'S COLUMN ONE IN CHRIST JESUS?

Galatians 3:27-28 says, "As many of you were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is no longer Jews nor Greek, slave nor free, male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus." As we draw to the close of what is the most bitter, contentious, mudslinging presidential campaigns in this nation's history, there will no doubt be anger and resentment towards those who have voted differently than you have. There may even be protests and riots once the elections results have been tallied, for whoever ends up in the Whitehouse after November 8, close to half of the nation will be upset, to say the least.

How then does the Christian respond to this mess? If they are fellow Christians, we need to see the other as a sister or brother. If they are not related to the faith, but are on the other side of the political aisle, we as Christians are called to reach across that aisle, difficult as it may be. 2nd Corinthians 5:18 says, "All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation." Jesus never said it would be easy to follow him.

Pastor and bestselling author Mark Batterson knows all about reconciliation and reaching across the aisle. He's led National Community Church (NCC) in the heart of Washington, D.C. for 20 years. Batterson has a unique interpretation of Galatians 3:28, where it says, "There is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female." We add, "Republican nor Democrat." He also says, "We believe that blood—the blood of Christ—is thicker than water—the water of political affiliation. Somehow the Lord has enabled us to reach across the aisle to both sides and keep our focus on Christ."

So, when all is said and done, please don't focus on our differences, vast though they may be. Focus on our calling to reconcile to the world to one another and to Christ, through whose blood has made us reconciled to God and called to follow the One who is the Prince of Peace.

THE PRESBYTERY OF THE REDWOODS

PRESBYTERY REPORT - September 17, 2016

The September meeting of Presbytery was held in Mendocino. Martha Lopez attended the morning session, Dan came for the afternoon and I was there for the entire meeting.

The meeting began with worship with a beautiful prelude by organist, Steve Gray. There was special music by Morgan Daniel and Gwyneth Moreland. Outgoing moderator, David Moon-Wainright's sermon was on "Responding to God's Word." The offering was for Pedal for Protein which supports our local food banks and also our community dinners. Rev. Kate Clayton was installed as Moderator and Hamp Maurvais, Vice-Moderator. We closed by singing together "The Lord's Prayer."

Report of the Mission Presbytery/Stated Clerk, Bob Conover: This was a written report only. Rev. Yung Me Morris was ordained and installed as pastor of Heritage Presbyterian Church in Benicia and Rev. Marissa Danney was ordained on behalf of San Francisco Presbytery and will be a hospital chaplain. The Rev. William Chalker died on June 4 at the age of 89. Our insurance companies and legal representatives are dealing with an accident that occurd in 2005 at Westminster Woods.

Presbytery Council: Proposed dates and locations for 2017 presbytery meetings are: Feb. 3, 2017 at First Presbyterian Church in Napa, the May 16 and September 16 meetings to be determined.

Committee on Preparation for Ministry: Patrice Drew read her Statement of Call and was approved by Presbytery to the status of Candidate.

The Report of the Review Committee was a written report only. Reviews do not need to be done every year. Clerks & Pastors only need to come when the Presbytery meeting is close to them. Regarding removing members from the rolls, Shirley Minor, Clerk of First Eureka, offered a letter and form that are very pastoral and carefully worded so the recipient is not offended and can make her/his desires known. The letter and form may be found on the presbytery website under Forms.

Report of the 22nd General Assembly Commissioners: Pam Novelly, Teaching Elder Commissioner, Fairfield Presbyterian Church and Sierra Mink, Young Adult Advisory Delegate, Presbyterian Church of Novato had written reports in our dockets. Ruling Elder Commissioner, Nancy Walsh, Westminster Presbyterian Church, Tiburon gave an oral report at Presbytery. Key decisions made: Two women were elected as Co-Moderators of General Assembly; The Belhar was added to the Book of Confessions; A new Directory for Worship; Commission created to deal with PC(USA) structural issues; Move to divest from fossil fuel companies was defeated; Two-state solution for Israel-Palestine reaffirmed; With an apology, assembly vows to keep children safe; "Regret" expressed for harm to LGBTQ/Q members;

"Teaching Elder" out, "Minister of Word and Sacrament" back in; Decision to reduce number of synods - continued on next page -

reversed; Commitment to peacemaking reaffirmed; Grady Parsons honored as retiring General Assembly Stated Clerk; J. Herbert Nelson elected as new General Assembly Stated Clerk.

Report by Ruling Elder Marita Mayer, Overture Advocate, San Anselmo Presbyterian Church.

1, Calling for the RE/MAX Corporation to Cease Selling Property in West Bank Settlements.

- Passed unanimously.
- 2. Advocating for the Safety and Well-being of Children of Palestine and Israel. Passed 464-95.
- 3. Israel-Palestine: For Human Values in the Absence of a Just Peace. Passed 429-129.
- 4. Prayerfully Studying the Palestinian Call for Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions (BDS). Passed 407-146.
- 5. On Affirming Nonviolent Means of Resistance Against Human Oppression: Passed by voice vote.

Committee on Ministry: The following read their Statements of Faith and had their biographies in the docket. Presbytery voted and approved these calls: Emily Stockert to Knox Presbyterian Church as temporary pastor and Brenna Hesch to First Presbyterian Church as Associate Pastor. Council acting on behalf of Presbytery approved the stated supply contract between the Rev. Jan Reynolds and First Presbyterian, San Rafael; Rev. Stephanie Ryder and Redwoods, Larkspur; and Rev. Wendy Komori Stager and Vallejo Community.

On June 30 Rev. Ron McHattie was moved to the status of honorably retired/member at large.

Passed as part of the consent calendar presbytery recommends a 2.5% cost of living increase for all existing calls. Approved the 2017 covenant between the Presbyterian Hunger Program and Patty Sanders, the Redwoods Hunger Action Advocate.

Presbytery ended with Patty Sanders and the Pedal for Protein Riders. Riders received their shirts and were leaving the next morning on their journey. This will relieve the operating budget considerably each year. However, the operating budget depends entirely upon congregational support – these are the regular expenses which keep "the doors open and the lights on", so to speak. Please keep this in mind as you fill in your pledge card for 2017, and, if possible, keep your support the same as before, or even increase it a little, as you feel led.

You may have noticed something on the bulletin board recently with the title "Caring for your Pastor" but you may not have had time to read the whole article. I would like to paraphrase the article for you as it has some valuable points to make.

First of all, have you ever thought about the fact that your pastor takes care of many people and perhaps he needs care himself from his congregation?

Some of the pressures that pastors face are:-

- 1. Pressure to succeed in "growing" the church whereas membership is dropping worldwide.
- 2. Pressure to keep people happy. Pastors spend an enormous amount of energy resolving internal disputes. You know the kind arguments about the hymns we sing or who used the Fireside Room last and left the table all sticky!
- 3. Financial pressures. Pastors salaries are on the low side in today's society as well as low respect. It helps if they know that what they are doing is meaningful and respected by others.
- 4. Strain on the family. Financial stresses and severe demands on time can have an impact on the pastor's family. Often the spouse is the breadwinner and has to assume major responsibility.
- 5. Pastors often have trouble being ministered to. They often do not take vacation, study leave or other time off which is offered to them by the congregation.

What can we do to take care of our pastor?

- 1. Acknowledge the stress of the profession. Acknowledge the strain of low salary and do not get into heated debates about monetary compensation.
- 2. Support your pastor's physical well being. Encourage him to run, play golf or whatever physical pastime he enjoys.
- 3. Allow him time off. Recognize the need for time off after a busy season such as Christmas or Easter.
- 4. Offer your pastor a gift certificate or a night out.
- 5. Treat family and spouses with sensitivity. Recognize that a spouse's gifts to the church are unrelated to being married to a clergyman.
- 6. Address your pastor's spiritual needs. Allow time to have him meet with a spiritual advisor. He should be encouraged to set aside time for prayer and Bible study separate from sermon preparation.

Remember some pastors may need to be reminded that they are important enough to deserve this kind of support.
