PASTOR'S PEN

Sisters and Brothers~

Maybe it's cool crisp air or maybe its the candy corn but I have to admit, I really do love fall. The changing colors and falling leaves, the pumpkin spice lattes (fat free if anyone might want to bring the pastor one,) and often a feeling to be frank, that the well as they say, is running dry. And maybe especially since the appearance of pumpkins and candy will soon make way for evergreens and candy canes, it is a time when I feel most keenly the need for Sabbath.

Yes Sabbath, that word, that practice, that commandment that keeps returning like the changing of the seasons. Just as the relaxed carefree days of summer give way to the start of fall activities, back to school, back to work, and zoom right from ghosts and goblins to Santa and Rudolph, soon the idea of taking time for Sabbath rest, on Sunday or any day for that matter, quite often gets pushed out by other things. We are stuck in a world and a season of do more, be more, have more, and we are driven by fear and anxiety to accomplish it all.

So at a time when the world tells us to speed up, what does it mean to slow down? To rest? To contemplate? To take time to appreciate the creation, all of it, even the parts that might not be so pretty? What if we were to think of Sabbath as an affirmation of our faith, and our identity as God's children?

Monastic wisdom calls us to enter into Sabbath rest as a source of goodness and renewal, (the opposite of that fear and anxiety stuff.) But, how many of us do not practice Sabbath because we feel we have too much to do? (guilty!) And here's the catch, there is a subtle message underlying our "I'm too busy" thinking, that the world cannot get by without our activity even for a day.

So back to autumn, consider for a moment those leaves that will soon leave the trees as an idea of Sabbath, of letting go of all the stuff that gives us anxiety and fear. As the leaf falls sometimes gently, sometimes violently by a gust of wind to the ground, does it know it will soon be received by the earth once more? As joy to the child who jumps in to play in the leaves? As inspiration to the artist capturing each color and vein? To ultimately provide nourishment for what is to come? Might the falling leaf help us contemplate our own trajectory of things?

Benedictine Oblate Christine Valters Paintner reminds us,

"The great wisdom of autumn is in the falling. It calls us to imagine entering into the journey of the leaf as it descends. We are never done with relinquishing what we hold most dear. Ego, possessions, expectations, accomplishments, control, these are the things that seize us as much as we seize them. Each year invites us to fall again." *And to Sabbath.*
