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PASTOR'S PEN

Never, I dare say, has anyone uttered the words, "Oh Goody! It's LENT!"

But guess what? "It's Lent! Oh goody .... "

I must admit I find myself in a bit of a quandary. These 40 days from Ash Wednesday to Easter (excluding Sundays if you're counting) are traditionally meant to be days of repentance, fasting and preparation for Easter, a time of self examination and reflection. Today Christians often focus this time on a more concerted effort to improve their relationship with God, choosing to either give something up and/or take something on in order to deepen their relationship and solidarity with Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness.

This year though Lent has taken on a slightly different meaning for me, thanks to both my star word and my circumstances. This year I find myself walking through a journey of grief, and so ashes and sack cloth seems, well, appropriate. And yet...I find myself in a duality both fighting the too easy excuse of the season, to sit as Elijah under my own broom tree and throw myself a pity party, not wanting to do the painful work of reflecting too much on anything and the reality as I was reminded on Ash Wednesday, "did you not know what the Holy One can do with dust?" (from *Blessing the Dust* by Jan Richardson)

So where, you are probably asking does my star word fit in to all this? Well the word I received this year was ENTHUSIASM. (you can all stop laughing now) What in the world do Lent and Enthusiasm have to do with one another? Let's face it, its' much easier to get enthusiastic about Easter, and summer vacation than repentance and reflection right? So this is what I am left with, how do I get enthusiastic about Lent?

Enthusiasm is often thought of almost like the cheerleader on the sidelines of a ballgame. A big smile on their face, jumping up and down in joyful support, spurring their team on to victory! Not exactly the mood Lent tends to exude. So I went to the dictionary for a little help and I found that one definition was, *strong excitement, or active interest.* Active interest, as opposed to just sitting idly by and waiting for life, or death to happen around us. Hmm maybe there's something here. Given this definition, the key it seems to me, is to actively embrace the opportunity of our Lenten journey, and to intentionally take part in it. How often in our lives do we get the opportunity to reassess where we are on the journey of self, faith, life and relationship? To catch a glimpse of where God is leading us as we look forward to the promise of resurrection and newness of life, even as we walk through the shadow and contemplate the cross?

Lent provides us with a unique opportunity, and we are invited to become enthusiastic about it. To reflect on what is, to give up all that might be holding us back, to move forward into God's possibilities for us, and to do it with enthusiasm.

Hmmm, come to think of it maybe this applies to the journey of transition this church is on as well. Now there is something to be enthusiastic about!

The coordinators for March are Lori Cole and Ruth Sommer and for April Jacque Moore and Ruth Sommer.







The first Presbytery Meeting of 2018 was held on Friday, February 9<sup>th</sup> at First Presbyterian Church, Santa Rosa, CA. Pastor Cheryl Finch, Nancy Mantel, Marcia Williams and Lori Cole attended the meeting representing First Presbyterian Church of Fort Bragg. Our Clerk of Session, Marsha Jeffries also attended an early meeting that same day to bring our Session records to be reviewed.

The first order of business was worship and it is such a blessing to worship together with fellow Presbyterians from all over Northern California. After a time of singing, a short sermon was given by Rev. Brenna Hesch on the power of light. She shared that as we begin the Season of Lent with Ash Wednesday, we enter into a time of darkness—always longing for the hope and light of Easter. But Easter will not be rushed. We are to remember that we are not the light—we are the witness of the light. We are to stay within the light, so that we can reveal the Light of the World through love, compassion and justice. The worship service concluded with the Celebration of the Lord's Supper and the dedication of

the 2018 Mission Pledges.

There was an interesting report from the 2017 Hunger Task Force sharing the results of the Cents-Ability offering of \$27,194 and the Pedal for Protein offering of \$45, 931. During 2017, Cents-Ability provided 22 grants totaling \$25,000. We heard a report from Covenant Presbyterian Church in Napa of turning unused church property into a garden to feed the hungry.

The proposed Mission Budget for 2018 was approved along with the Administrative/Ecclesiastical Budget.

The highlight of the day for all of us was the unanimous approval of Cassie Carroll by the Committee on Preparation for Ministry as a candidate for Ministry of Word and Sacrament with PCUSA. Cassie shared her Statement of Faith and how she grew up at Westminster Woods and yet made the decision to study four more years at the graduate level, in order to be sure her calling was to be with the Presbyterian Churches of the USA. Cassie's enthusiasm and love of Christ was contagious to all in attendance.

There were two presentations of General Assembly Overtures that were approved. The first one is a Call for RE/ MAX Corporation to Cease Selling and Renting Property in Israeli Settlements in the West Bank and East Jerusalem, from the session of First Presbyterian Church, San Anselmo. The Presbytery of New York City presented an Overture on promoting democracy, good governance, human rights and sustainable development in Madagascar.

The docket and other information from the Presbytery reports and presentations will be posted on the Mission Bulletin Board by March 4, 2018.
